You are invited to attend the 2014 meeting of the Timber Measurement Society, which will take place at the Coeur d'Alene Resort in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, April 9-11, 2014. The conference segment will occur on 9-10 April with a field trip to the Potlatch mills and log yard will be on 11 April.

The meeting will include two days of presentations from expert speakers on topics relevant to timber measurements.


The field trip will be to the Potlatch complex in St. Maries Idaho (one hour south of Coeur d'Alene) and will include a log rollout and mill tours of the sawmill and veneer/plywood plant. Please bring scaling gear (if you plan on scaling), hardhat and boots for the field trip.

Please make your reservations at the Coeur d'Alene Resort by calling 1-800-688-5253. The Coeur d'Alene has agreed to give us a nightly rate of \$99 for North Wing \$119 for a Park Tower and \$129 for a Lake Tower room. - Take exit 11 for Northwest Blvd toward City Center (0.3 mi)
- Turn right onto Northwest Blvd (2.1 mi)
- Turn right onto S 2nd St (187 ft)
- S 2nd St turns slightly left and becomes E Front Ave
- Destination will be on the right

Travelling westbound on Interstate 90 from Missoula

- Take exit 15 for Sherman Ave toward City Center (0.2 mi)
- Turn left onto E Sherman Ave (1.4 mi)
- Turn left onto S 5th St (302 ft)
- Take the 1st right onto E Front Ave
- Destination will be on the right
